Top Tips

Is your child finishing school this year and moving on to college, work, or training? Our careers advisers have put together some top tips to help with the transition.

Transport

- Plan how your child will travel, be it to college, work or training.
- Check travel times before the first day.
- If your child is travelling independently, why not have a practice run.



- Attend the Individual Development Plan review in the final year to ask any questions.
- Share what you think is working well and what isn't working so well.

Options

- Attend any open events to find out as much as possible. If there is more than one option, research them all to compare what's on offer.
- Don't forget to apply in good time as college courses can get full early and colleges may offer transition days while your child is still in school.
- Give yourself plenty of time to look at what's available.
- If your child is going to college, make sure the college has a copy of their Individual Development Plan or Learning and Skills Plan.

Support

- Make sure everyone who works with your child is aware of their intended next steps.
- Visit our <u>website</u> for advice for all ages.
- Talk to social services about adult services.
- Don't forget that the careers adviser, social worker, college transition worker are all there to help and answer questions.





Supporting you and your child

Careers Wales are here to support you and your child to make the right decision about their future.

Our careers advisers can:

\rightarrow	give impartial careers information, guidance and coaching.
→	help your child understand their strengths and reach their potential.
→	share information about various options, including work and further learning.
⇒	help your child set short-term and long-term goals related to their future options.
\rightarrow	support your child if they face setbacks and challenges.




The new Additional Learning Needs and Education Tribunal Act (ALNET) means that young people with Additional Learning Needs, who need additional learning provision, will have an Individual Development Plan (IDP) rather than a Statement of Special Education Needs or an Individual Education Plan. By September 2025,

the Act will cover all age groups in school.

If your child has an Individual Development Plan (IDP) their careers adviser may be invited to their annual review to discuss the transition from school. The careers adviser can provide information and advice about post school options. Additionally, they can signpost you to other agencies that can provide support to you and your child as they move on from school.

Alison and Macie's story

Real life stories

Careers advisers work with all schools in Wales to support learners with careers information, advice and guidance.

Alison Peel is a careers adviser based in north Wales who has supported young people with additional learning needs in schools and colleges for the past 13 years. The support she provides is tailored to each learner.

Alison shares how she has supported Macie Marsh, a year 14 pupil at Ysgol y Gogarth, who has additional learning needs and is leaving school this summer.



A package of support

"I first met Macie in 2019, when she was in year 9. Macie attended her first careers interview with me where we started to chat about what she might want to do in the future. Macie showed an interest in working in the school café and hairdressing.

"I met Macie again several times when in year 10 and 11 during group workshops. My workshops looked at skills, interests, interview techniques and decision-making skills.

"I sat down with Macie again to have a careers interview in year 12. I listened to her and asked questions, supporting her with her ideas. By year 12, Macie started to show an interest in being a classroom assistant. My role was to ensure that she was making the right decisions and create a next steps plan.

"I have attended many of Macie's annual reviews at Ysgol y Gogarth between years 9 and 14. The annual review is important to ensure that Macie is getting the support she needs and making progress to help plan for the future.

"Learners need to get a flavour of the world of work to make choices about their careers. We've organised for employers to visit the school and visits to different workplaces. We have run mock interview sessions with employers in school which Macie has enjoyed. She also attended our 'What Next?' careers events.

"I'm so happy to see that Macie is already gaining work experience as a classroom assistant, supporting young learners at Ysgol y Gogarth. Macie will leave school this summer and has successfully gained a place at Coleg Llandrillo on the Skills for Life and Work course and she also plans on doing some volunteering. I have enjoyed supporting Macie and wish her the very best in reaching her goals."

🔶 Looking forward

Macie adds "I have enjoyed speaking to Alison, she has helped me to understand my options and make a plan. She has always been there to help me, my mum and my teachers. At first I thought I wanted to be a hairdresser, but I like children and I'm really enjoying my work experience as a classroom assistant.

"Alison has always been there to listen to me and help me make choices about my future. She has made me feel much happier."

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What Next?

Choose Your Future event

Careers Wales recently hosted a 'What Next? Choose Your Future' event in Carmarthen, giving young people with additional learning needs the opportunity to explore future career options.

The event welcomed year 10 and 11 pupils from special schools across Carmarthenshire, Ceredigion, Pembrokeshire, and Powys. Over 150 learners were in attendance to explore their future careers.

10 organisations from a range of sectors supported the event. They offered information on jobs, careers, apprenticeships, training, and educational routes.

Learners took part in interactive workshops, enjoyed hands-on activities to learn about different jobs and were able to connect with potential employers. Careers advisers were also available to provide impartial advice and guidance on courses, qualifications, and career pathways.

Leanne McFarland, regional care career connector at WeCare Wales, said: "It's great to have these events organised by Careers Wales as they give a chance for all students to see what career opportunities are available to them, and what different options they have got after school."

James Harper, social impact manager at Principality, said: "It's great to be in Carmarthen today. It's fantastic meeting so many young people and we are working hard to raise awareness about careers in financial services across Wales."

Hannah Stephens, a Careers Wales business engagement adviser, said: "This event is all about creating an inclusive environment where young people with additional learning needs can connect directly with employers and training providers.

"As well as helping with their confidence and motivation, the information and encouragement they receive will help them to identify opportunities and make informed choices about their future careers."

Celebrating neurodivergence

Over 300 people recently attended our first jobs fair for neurodivergent jobseekers at our careers centre in Cardiff.

The event was organised in response to many neurodivergent customers sharing concerns about finding accommodating employers.

Working Wales, who organised the event, is delivered by Careers Wales and funded by the Welsh Government to provide careers guidance and employability support to those aged 16 and above.

Specifically designed for neurodivergent individuals, including those yet to be diagnosed, the fair enabled attendees to explore employment opportunities in an accessible and supportive environment.

Ten inclusive employers, including HMRC, BBC Wales, Barnardo's, Transport for Wales, the NHS, and Cyber Innovation Hub, attended the event to offer a range of career opportunities.

Attendees praised the event for being welcoming, inclusive, and tailored to their needs.

One participant said: "Looking for work when neurodivergent is daunting, so the fact there is an inclusive jobs fair is amazing."

Another attendee said: "I hope that there are more events like this."

Careers advisers were on hand throughout the event to offer personalised employability support.

Mike Keohane, Team Manager at Careers Wales, said: "We recognised a real need for an event like this. We wanted to do something for neurodivergent jobseekers where they could explore career opportunities with employers who understand and value their skills. Seeing so many attendees engage positively with employers and support organisations was fantastic, and we're thrilled with the feedback.

"Given the event's overwhelming success, we are looking forward to hosting more inclusive jobs fairs in the future."
